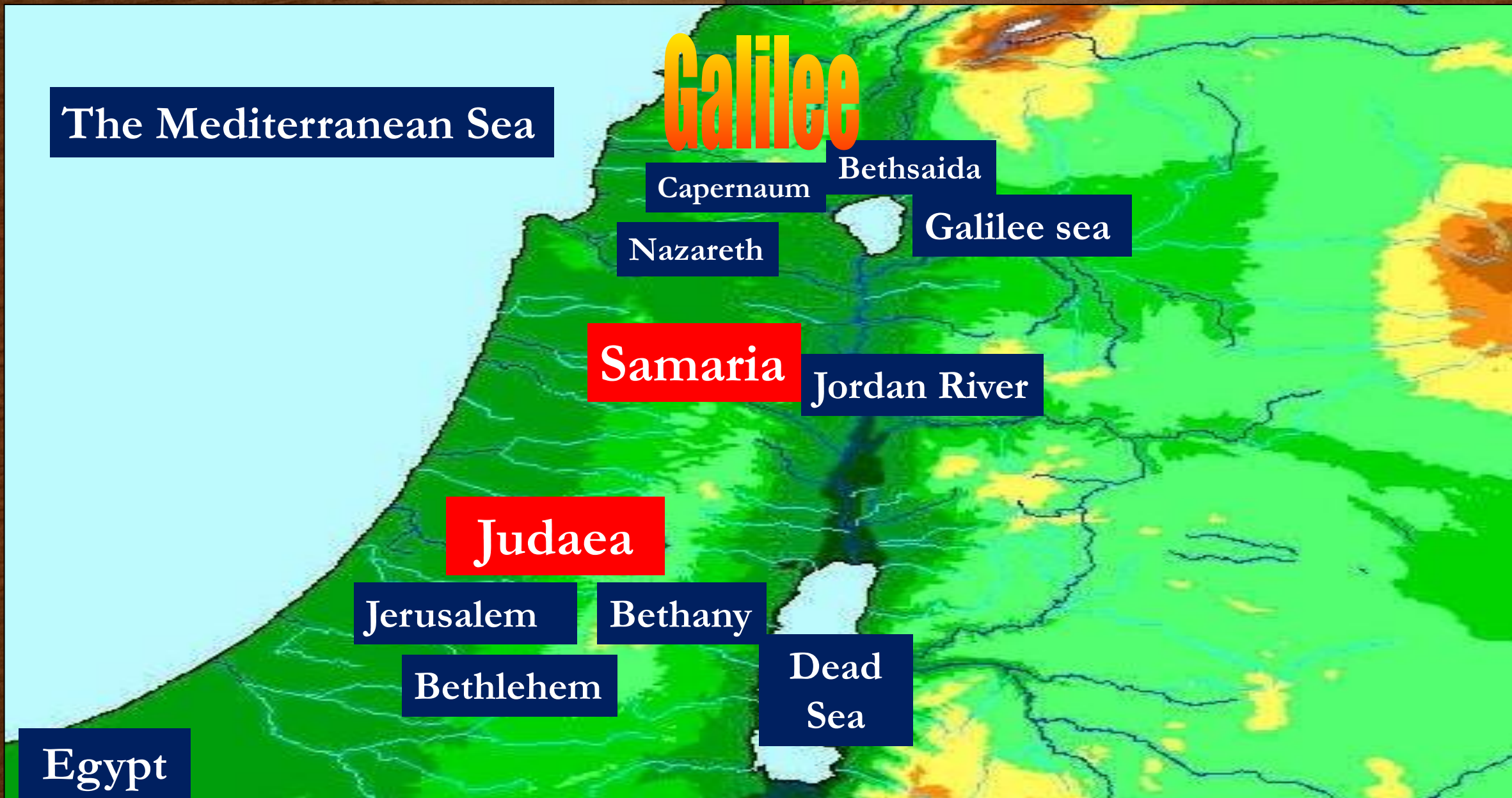

New Testament Overview

- Four Authors of the “Gospel” (*Evangelion*, . “good news”)
 - Matthew, Mark, Luke, John (but Mark is the oldest)
 - One “Acts” of the Apostles
 - Twenty-One “Letters” or “Epistles”
 - “Pauline Letters 14” – attributed to Paul of Tarsus
- + “Catholic/General Epistles” – attribute to other apostles
 - (James; 1 Peter; 2 Peter; 1 John; 2 John; 3 John; Jude)
 - One “Apocalypse” = Book of Revelation (singular!)
 - There are 260 chapters in the New Testament .

Matthew, Mark, Luke, John

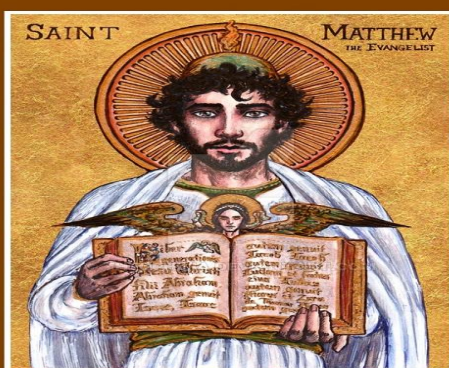
- We have One Gospel was written through four persons.

Introduction

St. Mark's Roots



- St. Mark was born in Libya from Jewish parents from the tribe of Levi
- Mark means hammer in Roman
- Barbarians stole their belongings so they moved to Jerusalem

St. Mark's Roots



- His mother was one of the servants who served Jesus Christ and she opened her house for Jesus and the disciples for the Last Supper
- Her house became the first church in the world and Jesus blessed it Himself

St. Mark's Service



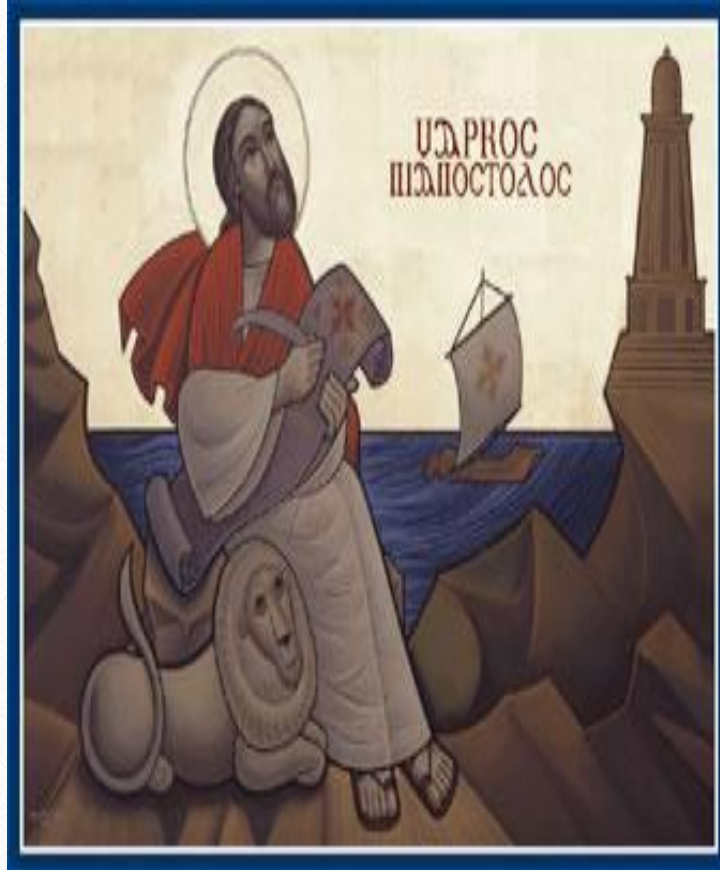
- St. Mark was one of the apostles chosen by Jesus Christ
- he started his service with St. Peter in Jerusalem
- In 61 AD, St. Mark established the church of Alexandria

St. Mark's Service



- The word of God quickly spread in Alexandria and St. Mark ordained 1 bishop, 3 priests, and 7 deacons

Martyrdom



- St. Mark was martyred in Alexandria in 68 AD
- The church called him “the Evangelist”

St. Mark's book of Gospel

- **When ...?**
- **Possibly 55
– 65 AD**

- **The oldest book in
the Gospel**
- **It was written in
Greek**

Written to:



- St. Mark wrote to the Romans, who were the strongest nation at the time, to show them that Jesus' kingdom is the strongest
- Jesus Christ controls everything seen and unseen

Sacraments of the Church in St. Mark's book

1. The Holy Trinity: Jesus' baptism (Mark 1: 9-11)
2. Baptism and faith are necessary for salvation (Mark 16:16)
3. Establishment of the sacrament of Eucharist (Mark 14: 22-24)
4. Reference to priesthood: appointment of the 12 disciples (Mark 3:13-19)
5. Sacrament of anointing the sick (Mark 6:13)

Key Verse:

For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.” Mark 10:45

Subject of the Book:



Present the character of Jesus Christ as the Glorious King in His Glorious Kingdom as a servant to the humanity through His actions and teachings

Gospel according to St. Mark



This book is divided into 2 parts:

- Chapter 1 to 10
- The doings, teachings, and miracles of Jesus Christ the servant until the Passover feast in Jerusalem

- Chapter 11 to 16
- Jesus Christ the servant
- His self-sacrifice and religious judgement
- His death and resurrection

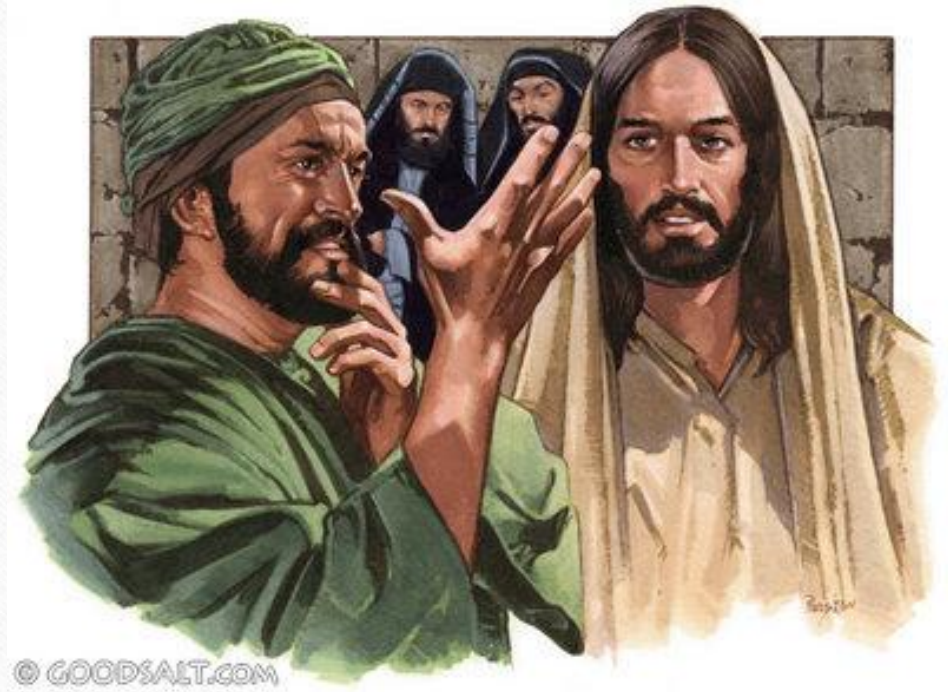

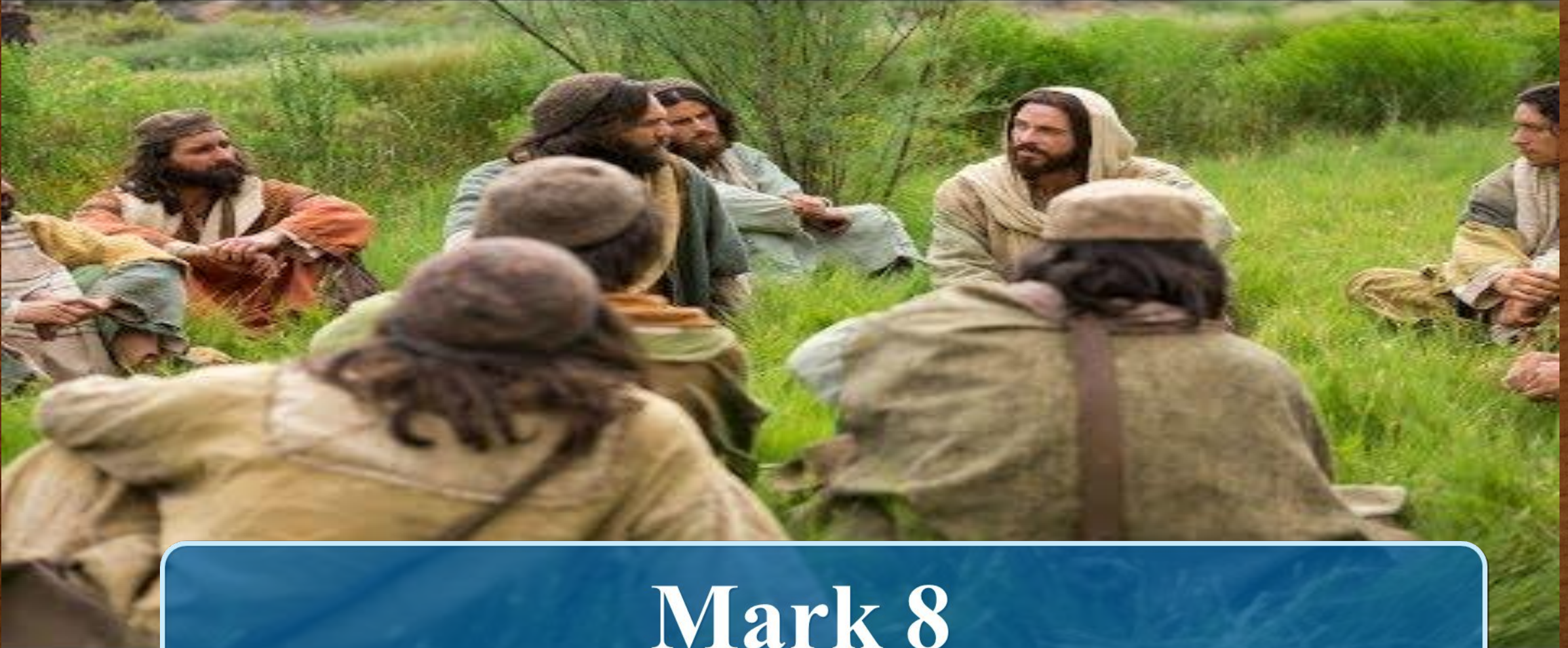

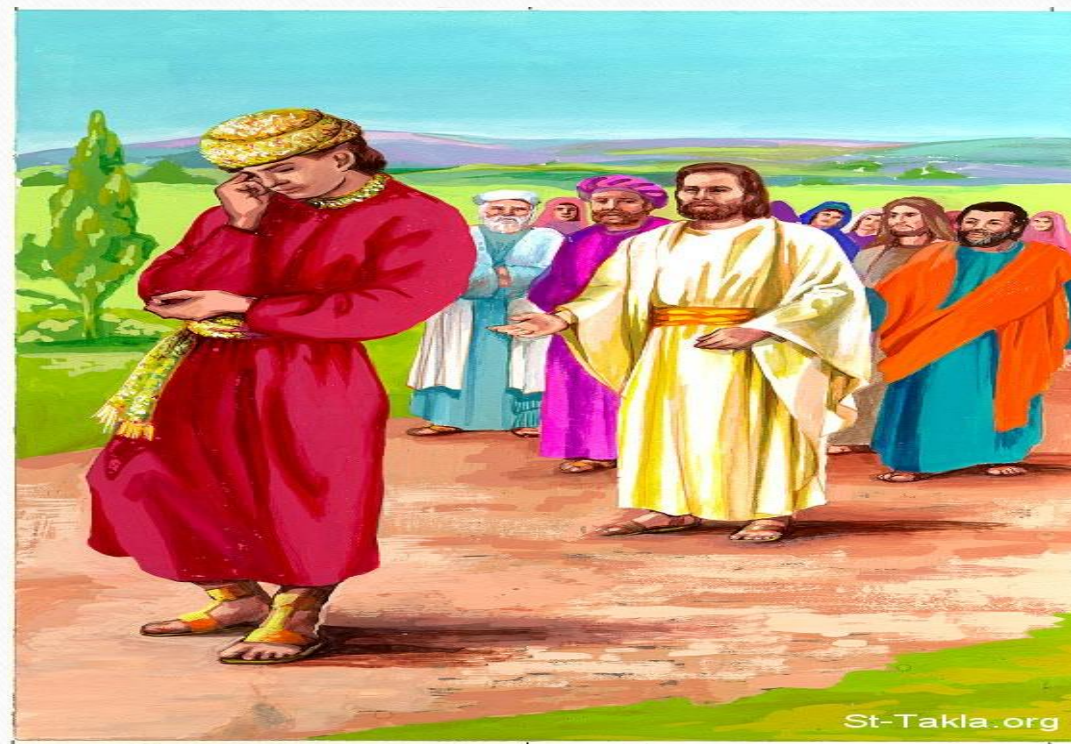

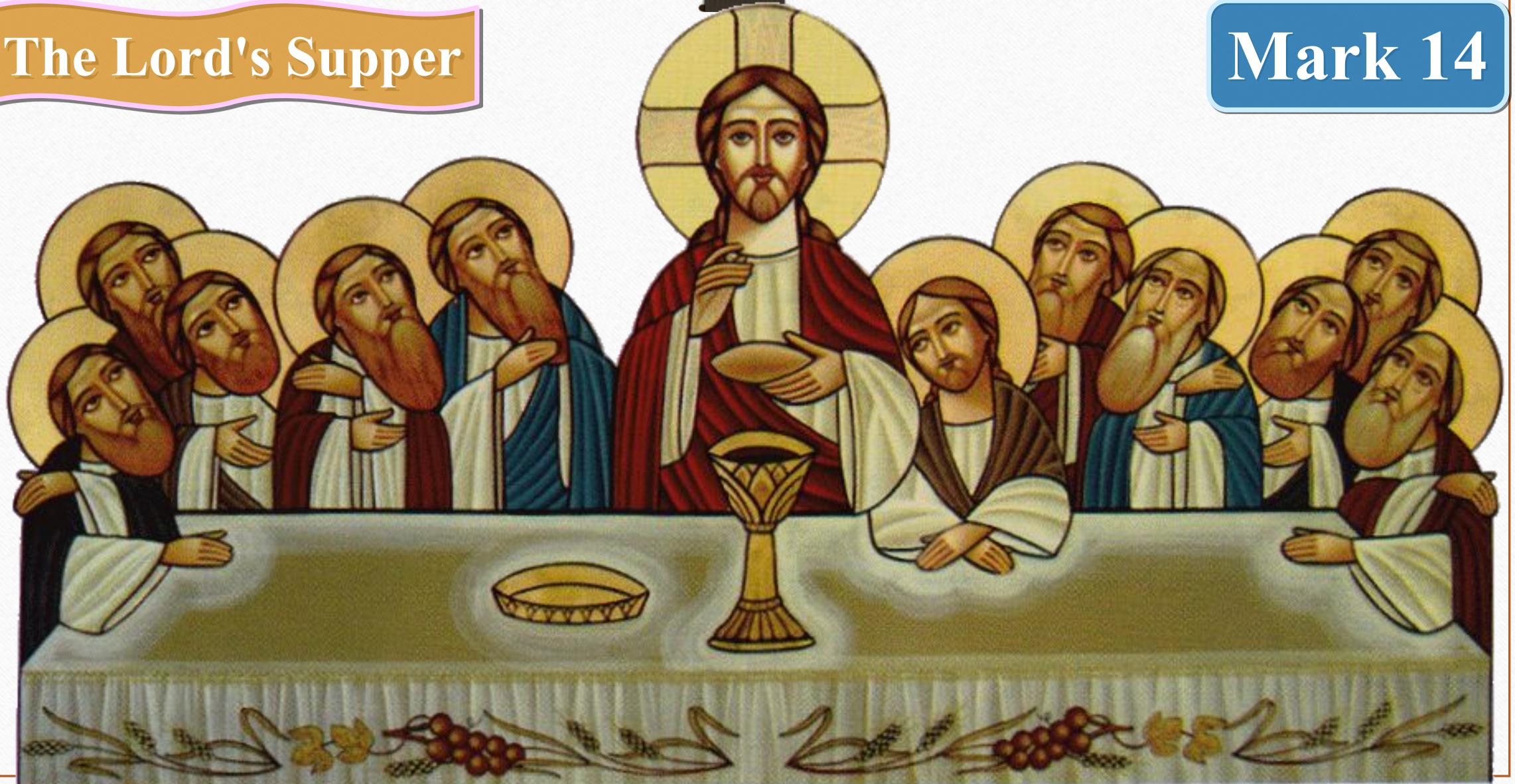
