Short Summaries

King Rehoboam decides to be even harsher to the Northern tribes than his father was, leading to the splitting of the kingdom. The Northern tribes form their own kingdom under the leadership of Jeroboam and avoid Jerusalem and the Southern tribes.

In 1 Kings 12, King Rehoboam of Judah consults with the older men who had served his father Solomon, and they advise him to lighten the burden of forced labor that his father had put on the people.

However, Rehoboam rejection their counsel, choosing instead to follow the advice of the young men who had grown up with him. This decision leads to a major revolt against Rehoboam, and the splitting of the kingdom of Judah and Israel

Summaries

In 1_Kings 12, the Israelites ask Rehoboam, Solomon's son, to be their king.

King Solomon died and his son Rehoboam became king. The people of Israel

Rehoboam is harsh with them, so they make Jeroboam their king instead.

asked Rehoboam to lighten their burdens, but he refused. So they rebelled against him and made Jeroboam their king.
